MAY: Asian/Pacific Heritage Month

The month of May has been designated by the U.S. Congress and the state of Washington as Asian/Pacific Heritage month. Fourteen years ago, in June, 1977, Representatives Norm Mineta (D-Cal) and Frank Horton (R-NY) introduced a bill in the U.S. House to establish a period of time to recognize the contributions of Asian Pacific Americans to our nation's heritage.

The original resolution specified the week of May 4 as Asian/Pacific Heritage Week, because that week included two significant occasions in Asian American history. May 7, 1843, according to the resolution's sponsors, was the date of the first arrival of Japanese in the United States. May 10, 1869, called "Golden Spike Day," was the day on which the Transcontinen-

tal Railroad was completed, largely by Chinese American labor.

In 1979, the resolution creating Asian/Pacific Heritage Week was passed by Congress and signed by the President. In 1990, the entire month of May was designated as Asian/Pacific Heritage Month. This year, two programs celebrating Asian/Pacific Heritage Month have been brought to the attention of the JACL Newsletter — Heritage: An Exhibition of Art by Asian Americans, co-sponsored by the Wing Luke Asian Museum and the Washington State Commission on Asian American Affairs, with the assistance of Velma Veloria, aide to State Representative Art Wang, and KCTS-TV Channel 9's Asian American Recognition month programs.

Heritage exhibit

The work of Asian/Pacific American artists will be displayed in this exhibit in the Third Floor Rotunda of the state capital building in Olympia from May 13—May 31. Irene Kuniyuki, a fine arts photographer and Lucia Enriquez, an illustrator, are coordinating the exhibit, which will showcase the diversity of art done by Asian Americans. The show will include paintings, prints, photography, and mixed-media pieces, and will open on May 13 at 12:30 pm. An opening reception will follow from 2 pm until 4 pm.

Color of Honor, a documentary film about Japanese Americans who served in the U.S. Armed Forces during World War II, those who remained in detention, and those who challenged the constitutionality of the internment.

Hot Summer Winds, the story of a 10year old girl named Yoneko who grows up amid a mixture of Japanese customs and American culture.

Sun, May 26 10:30 pm —

Visible Target, the story of the evacuation, with a special look at Bainbridge Island and the people who stood against the internment of their neighbors.

Mon, May 27 10:00 pm —

Carved in Silence: Angel Island, the story of Chinese immigrants imprisoned on a small island in San Francisco Bay before being allowed to enter the United States.

The committee is planning a three-day program scheduled for February 18–20, 1992 at the University of Puget Sound. Speakers will be Dr. Gordon Hirabayashi, Professor Peter Irons (author of *Justice at War*, a history of the 1942 legal cases against the internment), Judge William Marutani, National JACL President Cressy Nakagawa, and tentatively, Senator Daniel Inouye.
