Kame Project: Aging and the Nikkei population

Health changes that occur with aging in the Japanese American population of Seattle-King County is the focus of new study being conducted by the University of Washington. Funded by the National Institute on Aging, the Kame project is named after the Japanese symbol of longevity, the turtle. The study will look closely at the elements of aging that affect the quality of life of older Nikkei.

Researchers hope to identify potential risk factors—heredity, environment, etc.—associated with disabling memory and thinking losses, and in doing so, provide new insights into the prevention of disease in future generations.

Annually, for a period of ten years, the study will track the health status of Nikkei over the age of 65. All candidates for the study will be interviewed and given free tests of vision, hearing, neurological wellbeing, and reaction time. Subgroups of randomly selected eligible participants will be offered more

detailed clinical and neurological examinations at no cost. The results of these examinations will be sent to participants' primary care physicians.

One of the goals of the Kame Project is to serve as a community resource for those interested in the issues of aging. The study will potentially offer seminars on such topics as successful aging, Alzheimer's Disease, caregiving, and the legal and financial aspects of aging. There will also be a newsletter to keep the public informed of the latest developments in aging research and health education for seniors.

The project will begin with a brief survey questionnaire that will be sent in the fall to all Nikkei households listed in public directories in Seattle-King County. This confidential survey will be used to identify and locate persons over 65 or who will turn 65 during the course of the study.

Nomura exhibit reception



Asian Pacific Americans: Political Leadership in the Nineties


