Nikkei Vets receiving redress payments denied pensions

The Veterans Administration has terminated pension benefits for several Nikkei veterans in California after the vets reported receiving redress payments.

"So far there has just been two cases reported to our office," said Joy Morimoto, regional director for the Northern California JACL. She said that a third veteran has contacted the Office of Redress Administration (ORA). All three veterans had just received checks in the second round of redress payments, paid to those born in 1927 or earlier (ages 67 or older).

"These gentlemen had gotten their check in October and reported them to the VA," says Morimoto. A month after reporting the redress payments, the veterans were denied their pension benefits.

Morimoto says that the veterans had been receiving approximately \$400-500 a month before their benefits were denied. Morimoto contacted a case worker from the Los Angeles Department of Veterans Affairs who verified that termination policy for redress recipients. Morimoto said that the case worker seemed clear on the issue.

JACL is currently appealing the case of one veteran

who received a letter from the Department of Veterans Affairs informing him of its decision to terminate his pension payments. Citing that the \$20,000 redress payment is counted as income and therefore exceeds the maximum income limitation set by law, the department gives veterans the option of appealing the decision or reapplying after a period of one year.

The Civil Liberties Act of 1988 clearly exempts redress payments as income for purposes of determining eligibility for many federally assisted health and housing benefits, including veterans' benefits. This exemption is contained in Section 105(f)(2) of the Act which states that amounts paid to an eligible individual "(2) shall not be included as income or resources for purposes of determining eligibility to receive benefits described in section 3803(c)(2)(C) of title 31, United States Code, or the amount of such benefits." Veterans' benefits under chapters 11, 13, 15, 17 and 21 of title 38 are included in Section 3803(c)(2)(C), and in particular, income determinations for pension purposes are covered in chapter 15.

JACL Legacy Fund

The JACL PNWD has reached 45% of it goal of \$700,000 with \$313,555 in contributions and pledges raised as of November 27, 1991. Of the total raised for the PNW, Seattle has contributed over 60% with \$190,845 raised from approximately 233 donors, followed by Portland with \$22,620 or 7% of the total. Ranking second to Seattle nationwide in total amount raised is the San Francisco chapter with \$109,270.

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

International District Photo Exhibit



Museum wins Multicultural Grant

The Wing Luke Asian Museum was selected as one of eight recipients of a \$13,000 grant from the Metropolitan Life Foundation's Multicultural Initiatives program. This grant will be used to assist in the development and installation of a new exhibit on the history and culture of Chinese, Japanese, Filipinos, Koreans, Southeast Asians and Pacific Islanders who have settled in Washington state. The display will include approximately 100 photos and 250 artifacts, and is slated to open as part of the museum's permanent collection early in 1993.







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Art Against Racism

Irene H. Kuniyuki was awarded a King County Cultural Resources Division Art Against Racism grant. She will design a limited-edition poster dealing with the racist hysteria directed toward Japanese Americans during World War II and the recent increase of racial harassment against Asian/Pacific Americans. The poster will use images of the Relocation Centers, FBI photographs, documents, and artifacts. The posters will be distributed countywide.

"The fact that several veterans have already had their benefits terminated is disturbing," said Dennis Hayashi, JACL national director. "The Office of Redress Administration is aware of this situation and is seeking a clarification from the Veterans Administration in Washington, D.C. However, there is a sense of urgency in immediately appealing these cases because many veterans depend on these pensions."

Havashi added that there is concern about other veterans out there who may have also lost their benefits but not questioned it. It is important for veterans to know what their rights are and the resources available to them. If you are a veteran and have received a similar letter from the Department of Veterans Affairs, or know of someone who has, contact Joy Morimoto at National JACL Headquarters, (415) 921-5225.

The long awaited Japanese American Community Directory is available now! Seattle Chapter JACL volunteers began this project in June of 1991 and distributed the 64 page directory in the mail the second week of January. The directory contains over 12,000 people of Japanese Ancestry living in the Greater Puget Sound area. It also contains over 1,000 listings of Japanese American businesses.

The last Japanese American Community Directory was published by the Seattle JACL almost 10 years ago. Since there were so many changes and additions, the directory committee had to start from scratch. Volunteers canvassed about a dozen telephone directories in the Greater Puget Sound area.

The committee was able to raise about \$6,000 in advertisements thanks to local businesses. Although this revenue has helped to offset the \$14,000 cost of production and mailing, we need your help!
