

President's Report

It is true that any new year always brings with it a change in the officers and Board membership of our JACL chapter. If each incoming board had to start anew on an annual basis, such a situation would undoubtedly lead to organizational chaos. Fortunately, the fact that approximately two-thirds of the Board membership traditionally carries over from one year to the next assures a good deal of continuity and stability in program, activities, and basic philosophy.

At the same time, the one-third that is new offers the possibility for different and creative ideas that will lead to our further growth and development. As the new president who is still try-

to get a sense of what the job is, I feel grateful to my predecessor, Ray Ishii, not only for the great leadership he demonstrated last year but also for leaving the Chapter in a fundamentally sound condition. It seems to me that he deserves our special thanks for the major contributions he has made.

This year, we have nine members who are new to the Board, four who are returning after having served earlier, and twentyone who are continuing. It promises to be an outstanding group, and I look forward to working with them.

I have long been a card-carrying member of JACL but except for a couple of brief stints of service on the Board or on committees have never become very involved or active. Only after retiring from my job two years ago did I decide that it was time to make some kind of contribution to the community, and in one sense, that is my reason for taking on the office.

The organization is currently dealing with some problems on the national level, but locally, we are quite well, thank you. But check with me in a few months.

Approximately 4,000 Washington state Nikkei were original settlers of the Tule Lake Relocation Center in Northern California near the Oregon border, and it contained the second largest number of the state's Nikkei after Minidoka. On May 19 and 20 of this year, there will be fifth reunion of the Tuleans in Sacramento at the newly remodeled Red Lion Hotel and Resort.

Although previously held during the Memorial Day weekend, it will be held a week earlier this time to avoid a conflict with a jazz festival. Aside from the usual mixer and Sayonara Banquet, there will be a trip to Reno, shopping trips to discount malls and a golf tournament. Also new this year will be a symposium, "Past is Prologue: The Japanese American Legacy," which will explore the passing of the torch to future generations of Nikkei. 
