Since this tragic event, the Asian and Pacific Islander Women and Family Safety Center has been committed to holding an annual vigil to remember these women and others whose lives were destroyed by violence. Seattle JACL has agreed to support this event by encouraging their broad network to attend.

This past November, Evelyn Matsen and her 13-yearold son, Wahren Agonoy, were shot multiple times by the husband. We are again reminded of the importance of diligently educating and preventing violence.

Civil Rights Committee

The JACL Civil Rights Committee had its first meeting in January. After reflecting on activities from the past year, the Committee brainstormed areas to work on in 2006. Three general areas emerged:

Legislative - The state legislative session is in full swing, and a lot of civil rights issues need to be quickly addressed. The Civil Rights Committee identified bills relating to the achievement gap, cultural competence, voting rights, and anti-discrimination.

Coalition-Building - The big planning event for the committee in 2005 was the City Council Candidates Forum in October. The event brought together people
