Update from the Civil Right Committee

This year in the legislature, JACL will continue to monitor legislation in Olympia to advance our civil rights goals, and will continue to support community allies who share our vision for a just and equal society.


Last year JACL supported bills to make it illegal to discriminate based on sexual orientation (passed); to ensure a child's cultural heritage is considered in parent custody (did not pass); and to allow colleges and universities to consider race as a factor in a holistic admissions process (did not pass).

As we enter the 2007 legislative session, it's hard to say what will become the key civil rights issues. The session runs from January 8 to April 22, and a lot can happen in that time frame. Some issues to keep an eye on include voting rights bills that would impact communities of color; recognition of same-sex relationship; educational disparities and the achievement gap; and an attempt to repeal the recently-passed Anti-Discrimination bill.

Also, save the date! API Legislative Day is Tuesday, February 13 in Olympia! API Legislative Day is the annual lobbying day for the Asian Pacific Islander Coalition, which JACL supports. Every year, API Legislative Day brings people from around the state to the Capitol to meet with elected officials to advance a common legislative agenda and mobilize the API community statewide.

Prior to becoming the Executive Director, in the 1980's, John served many years in the organization as the Chair of the Redress Committee. He and his committee guided the course of redress to a successful ending, with the signing of a bill by President Regan. Many of those who worked with John during the redress movement, were local Seattle chapter members. People like Cherry Kinoshita, Chuck Kato, Henry Miyatake, and others who were so involved in the redress movement of the 80's.

Over the last eight years, John Tateishi has been serving the JACL as its Executive Director. In those eight years, he has kept the organization in the forefront of civil rights affairs. He's managed to keep the organization afloat by finding corporate funders to help with special projects and programs. Although the financial situation caused a reduction in staff, John, like all the staff, had taken on more than double the load by doing all jobs required at headquarters.

John has been successfully building strong relationships with many organizations around the country. JACL's name is more widely known because of John's efforts. Although our name is strongly tied to civil rights in the Japanese American community, in recent years that has not been the case. John has put our name on the radar screen again, and our work against hate crimes and the promotion of education is again in the forefront.

Snow lined the streets of Denver on a brisk November day in 2006. I decided to do a pilgrimage to Sakura Square supermarket, where I spent hours as a child hoping for a box of delicious chocolate coated Pocky while my parents shopped for kamaboko and mochi.

Growing up in Colorado, it was also rare to see other Asian Americans, so it was a treat to hear an occasional Japanese word or two. There was an unspoken understanding in seeing another Asian face. In those days, being Japanese American meant an occasional delicious treat that no one else ate, or listening to Enka music on long car rides. However, as with everything else in life, being older means realizing the depth and complexity of relatively simple things.

As I walked through the aisles of the market at Sakura Square, I saw things in a very different light. I reflected on our rich and powerful legacy, one that we can be proud of. I've learned that our culture is also defined by the struggles we've faced, the obstacles we've overcome and the issues that we continue to face.

As a 30 something adult, my definition of community still hasn't changed much. I believe community is the desire to seek this familiarity and comfort in people who have similar experiences.

The Seattle JACL is my Sakura Square today...the community that I sought as a child. There is a rich legacy of the Seattle JACL being a leader in civil rights and social justice, while recognizing the complexity of our dynamic Asian American culture. Seattle JACL has been a nationwide leader in civil rights. From being one the chartering chapters of the JACL, hosting the first JACL national convention, and leading the Internment reparation movement, we have contributed to making the Japanese American community what it is today.

As we look forward to this coming year, I believe it's important to honor this past by continuing to be a leader in civil rights, social justice and bringing people together in community. I also believe that it's important to come together and celebrate our dynamic community, which now includes people of multiracial ancestries and people who believe in the work Seattle JACL has led.

This year, we can look forward to providing community forums to give people opportunities to explore our dynamic and complex Asian American culture. We will continue to be on the front lines of civil rights issues, seeking partnership with like-minded groups, and being on the leading edge of encroaching issues. Finally, we will look ahead to the future in putting together a nationwide study on Japanese American community, and exploring the future of Japanese American community.
