As responsible citizens, it's up to us. The problem will not go away by ignoring it, or hiding from it. What do we do about it, . . . and us?

rest of the group. Because we cannot escape from being judged as a group it is important for us to have an organization that promotes the good image of the Japanese American. Public acceptance of this image results in a more rapid and lasting integration.

We would also like to remind you that in our struggle for the major legislative battles we have built an effective national organization which is the envy of many other minority groups. While it's true that the major issues of the time have been successfully gained, we do have many smaller ones which are current and others that suddenly crop up. In addition, a national organization such as ours attracts political aspirants much more than individual scattered groups and we can work more effectively with them to our benefit.

We believe that we warrant your support because JACL is the only organization working in the serious political field for the Japanese American. Politics, even on a non-partisan basis, is something that affects our everyday life. We have a direct pipe-line into Congress, White House, State Legislature wherever our chapters are located. This is also true of our local government. Aside from the above all important program, we try to fill the needs of the local community in other areas not covered by other Japanese American organizations.

In the vital area of Civil Rights we strongly advocate that the only way to secure our rights on a permanent basis is to secure the rights of all Americans.

It is obvious in this hustle and bustle of everyday life that many of you cannot personally attend meetings and participate actively in the local programs. However, we hope that you can, at least, support the organization with your membership.
