POSTAL EMPLOYEES GRIEVANCE COMMITTEE ATTRACTS ATTENTION OF CHAPTER HUMAN RELATIONS COMMITTEE

Don Kazama, chairman of the human relations committee made the following report before the Chapter board:

"It has recently come to our attention that equal employment opportunities for orientals within the postal department raises serious questions as to its availability. There are by some count 240 orientals employed by the post office. Very few of these are in supervisory capacities although it seems without doubt that many are qualified.

"Now it is my understanding that in order to be considered for most of the supervisory positions, one must take an examination. The orientals have been conspicuously absent in applying. There are attempts being made to correct this situation which is in addition to what we as JACL can do or ought to do. A member of the equal employment opportunity committee in the post office is energetically contacting oriental employees and plans meeting in the near future for orientals with Jim Symbol, who is the regional director of the post office. Mr. Symbol has written to Mr. G. Morrey, postmaster to the effect that Mr. Morrey encourage the orientals to apply for supervisory exams.

"JACL enters the picture in two ways. First, as a human relations chairman, I plan to maintain contact (with Oriental employees representative) in this matter. Assist him in whatever way I can. Secondly, it may be necessary that JACL Seattle Chapter sponsor a series of courses on the supervisory exam such as the Urban League has done. One could borrow from their experience. Therefore, I move that if necessary the human relations committee be given the authority to sponsor a course or courses to assist oriental postal employees to apply for and in taking supervisory examination."

The board approved the proposal presented by Don Kazama.

MEMBERS DRIVE TEAMS FORMED TO TOP LAST YEAR'S ROLL

Membership chairman Tak Kubota aims to better the outstanding record performance of last year. Six teams have been selected for the current drive, each headed by a captain. 407 members have been counted so far following the PNWDC meeting of Mar. 3.

\$7 membership will include a year's subscription to the Pacific Citizen, a weekly paper covering the Nisei world. One Thousand Club drive is also on in trying to capitalize the potential which exists in this area.

MASSIVE PLAN FOR JAPANESE CULTURAL FESTIVAL RELEASED

The Japanese Cultural Festival will be held at the Flag Plaza Pavilion of the Seattle Center on July 12, 13, 14 (Friday, Saturday, Sunday). At present the exhibits will open from 12 noon to 9:30 or 10 p.m. The evening programs will begin at 7:30 p.m. and last approximately an hour and a half. The announcement was made by Dr. Minoru Masuda, chairman of the project. Tom S. Iwata has been appointed vice chairman. More than 18 committee chairman has also been appointed to handle the specialized details of the exhibits and activities. Exhibits will include calligraphy, sumi drawing, issei story, nisei story, Kyogen exhibit, Japanese art treasures, Japanese N.W. artists, Japanese Government exhibits, Ikebana and bonsai, dolls, origami, go tournament and landscaping. Evenings will be filled with programs.

HAYASAKA SPEAKS ON JACL ROLE IN THE CURRENT CIVIL RIGHTS MOVEMENT DURING PNWDC SESSION

Philip Y. Hayasaka spoke to the PNWDC. He emphasized that local chapters' external influence in the civil rights program needs much to be desired. One disturbing study mentioned by Hayasaka finds that the image of Japan and acceptance of Nisei is closely identified on how other Americans view the Nisei. Japan is viewed favorably today but what about tomorrow? Our relation with white is so shaky, we have to be passive. We live in a closed racial society and it is tragic to me, he added. JACL can if it wants to become a bridge of communication between the white and the Negroes to help destroy the myths of the minority people. Hayasaka's talk was the most comprehensive heard here on the possible role of JACL in the current human relations struggle.
